At approximately 2:00 p.m. on June 7, 1988, Sergeant BARNEY PHILLIPS and this investigator interviewed Mr. BILLY HEATH at his place of employment in reference to information he might have concerning the deaths of DON HENRY and KEVIN IVES. Mr. HEATH is an ambulance attendant who works for the Saline Memorial Hospital and was working the night of the incident. The following will be the information related to this investigator by Mr. HEATH.

Mr. HEATH stated, "On the night of the incident he was working for the ambulance service and at approximately 4:37 they received a call to a train incident and they arrived at the scene in Alexander at approximately 4:43 a.m. Mr. HEATH stated this arrival point was the location where they drove as far as they could and met with the other officers and individuals who were at the scene. Mr. HEATH stated that they had to walk down the tracks and his partner, SHIRLEY RAPER, was walking behind him. Mr. HEATH stated that he came across Deputy CATHY CARTY and they went on down the tracks and found the first part of the bodies and Mr. HEATH stated he thought this was approximately seventeen cars down the track. Mr. HEATH stated it took him about two to four minutes to arrive at the bodies from where they parked the ambulance. According to Mr. HEATH he was not aware of the boys being deceased upon his arrival and first thought that the incident involved a train hitting a car with individuals in the car. Mr. HEATH stated the bodies looked more like mannequins, that there was very little blood at the scene and the blood at the impact sight was very dark. Mr. HEATH stated that they had quite a few flashlights and could see fairly well. Mr. HEATH stated the blood to him was just too dark for him to consider normal. Mr. HEATH stated he did not see any bright blood and in his opinion there should have been some fresh blood at the scene. Mr. HEATH stated this was his first train incident to work as an ambulance attendant.

Mr. HEATH stated he started with the ambulance service the winter of 1985,

received his EMT Basic Training in 1985 in Camden, and in 1986 he received his intermediate certificate from the Med-Center, and in July 1987 he graduated from the Paramedics Course in Texarkana.

Mr. HEATH stated that he drove the ambulance to the scene, but sometime during the incident SHIRLEY RAPER left with the ambulance to try to find a short cut to the tracks. Mr. HEATH stated at this time he was still working on the tracks and did not know that Ms. RAPER had left.

Mr. HEATH stated that they left the scene at 6:16 a.m., as the coroner was coming in on one of the railroad trucks. Mr. HEATH stated that he personally went down both sides of the tracks and had located all the body parts. Mr. HEATH stated the Sheriff's Office had advised not to touch or move anything. According to Mr. HEATH it was evident that they could not do anything else, so they left."

Mr. HEATH also provided this investigator with a copy of his report that he filled out concerning this train incident.

On June 7, 1988 at approximately 10:20 a.m., Sergeant BARNEY PHILLIPS and this investigator interviewed Mr. DAN HARMON at his office in Benton, Arkansas in reference to information he had concerning this case. The following will be the information related to this investigator by Mr. HARMON.

Mr. HARMON stated that information was received that a TINA TAYLOR who lives in England, Arkansas and works at the shoe factory had made a statement that a JOELLE MATHEWS who also works at the shoe factory had told her (TAYLOR) that she (MATHEWS) knew some information about the deaths of the IVES and HENRY boys. The information was that MATHEWS was stating that a black male had come to her trailer the night of the incident with a gun looking for the IVES and HENRY boys.

JOELLE MATHEWS is suppose to be living in England, working at the shoe factory, but at one time was living with JEFF MADDEN in Indian Springs Trailer Park and they were also very close to a DARREN O'NEIL. O'NEIL is a white male, DOB: 3-12-69, with an address of 407 Raymar Road in Bryant, Arkansas.

Mr. HARMON stated at approximately three months ago RICHARD GARRETT and himself interviewed JOELLE MATHEWS and she denied saying these things to TINA TAYLOR, but stated that MADDEN and O'NEIL knew what had happened to the boys.

Mr. HARMON stated that a CLIFTON OLLAR who lives in Tull, Arkansas, phone number 778-5711, and his parents lives on Border and North Street in Benton, had information concerning the deaths of the boys. OLLAR is suppose to be out of town four days a week with a job he has with the highway department. Mr. HARMON stated that he had contacted CLIFTON OLLAR's sister, CLAUDIA, and his sister had told that her brother, CLIFTON had made the statement that he knew who did the killings and everybody in Bryant knew that JAMES CALLAWAY and KEN COOK did the killings because the boys owed them some

money.

Mr. HARMON stated that he had contacted TOMMY MADISON who is known to this investigator in this investigation and that MADISON had told him that there was a black female named FERN in Hardscrabble, off Highway 5 in Little Rock who knew something about the deaths. Mr. HARMON gave information concerning JAMES CALLAWAY having information and possibly being involved in an attempted robbery at Western Meat Packing Company in Little Rock where information is that he may have set the robbery up for two brothers who were involved in a killing in Saline County and these brothers were suppose to pull the robbery. Information is that the brothers then started talking about having to kill someone during the robbery and CALLAWAY got cold feet and backed out. CALLAWAY then contacted DINK FRENCH and FRENCH put him in contact with the owner of the Western Meat Packing Company and extra security was placed on the Meat Packing Company and the bank robbery was thwarted and never occurred.

Mr. HARMON stated that there was a subject who worked for CALLAWAY at CALLAWAY's Used Car Lot whose son was suppose to have burglarized the owner of CROCKETT's Motor Company in Little Rock's house in Saline County. Mr. HARMON advised that some of the stolen merchandise was traced to CALLAWAY's Car Lot and that CALLAWAY had made the statement that \$90,000.00 worth of drug money was also stolen in the burglary.

Mr. HARMON stated that CALLAWAY and COOK had recently been linked to a robbery of AP & L in Little Rock that occurred two to three years ago and AP & L had terminated both CALLAWAY and COOK.

Mr. HARMON stated that JAMES CALLAWAY's daughter attended a party approximately two weeks ago at ALLEN SMITH's house and while at the party was severely beaten. SMITH is a white male who is suppose to be a drug dealer in the Bryant area.

Mr. HARMON stated that a DAVID REYNOLDS and RENEE WRIGHT were suppose to have met with KEVIN IVES and DON HENRY on the day of the incident and therefore may need to be talked to concerning this case.

Mr. HARMON stated that he was going to dictate a tape of all the information that he had concerning the leads that Mr. GARRETT and himself were running down. Mr. HARMON stated he would then turn over the dictation to us to make us aware of the information and for the information to become part of the case file.

At approximately 10:10 a.m. on June 8, 1988, Sergeant BARNEY PHILLIPS and this investigator interviewed TINA TAYLOR at her place of employment in England, Arkansas in reference to information she might have concerning the deaths of DON HENRY and KEVIN IVES. The following will be the information related to this investigator by Ms. TAYLOR.

Ms. TAYLOR stated approximately two to three months ago while she was working with JOELLE MATHEWS at the England Shoe Factory that JOELLE had told her she knew something about the deaths of DON HENRY and KEVIN IVES, but that she was afraid to say anything because the guys would come looking for her. Ms. TAYLOR stated that she told her that she needed to tell what she knew and she would be protected. Ms. TAYLOR stated that she told her cousin, BECKY ELLIOTT, who lives in Bryant and that she told DON's mother's best friend who then told DON's mother.

Ms. TAYLOR stated that JOELLE MATHEWS told her that she knew of some guys who were selling some drugs and that the HENRY and IVES boys got in trouble with them. Ms. TAYLOR stated that MATHEWS told her that she could probably I.D. them and knew their names and faces. Ms. TAYLOR stated that MATHEWS told her that she thought the boys were killed because of drugs. Ms. TAYLOR stated that Ms. MATHEWS did not say anything to her about a black male coming to her residence with a gun looking for the boys.

Ms. TAYLOR stated that she knew JOELLE because she was her supervisor at the Clear Lake Footwear Shoe Factory in England. Ms. TAYLOR stated that she lived in Bryant near the ball park and went to school with IVES and HENRY and that her best friend KIM BROTHERS dated DON HENRY at one time.

At approximately 9:25 a.m. on June 8, 1988, Sergeant BARNEY PHILLIPS and this investigator interviewed JOELLE MATHEWS at her place of employment in England, Arkansas in reference to information she might have concerning the deaths of DON HENRY and KEVIN IVES. The following will be the information related to this investigator by Ms. MATHEWS.

Ms. MATHEWS stated that at no time while she was living in Bryant, Arkansas that a black male come to her house with a gun looking for the IVES and HENRY boys. MATHEWS stated that she knew the boys from school, but she never made a statement to TINA TAYLOR about a black male coming to her house looking for them.

MATHEWS stated that the night of the incident she was at DARREN O'NEIL's house in Bryant, behind Bryant Plastic. Ms. MATHEWS stated that there was no black male that came to this house. Ms. MATHEWS stated that the following people were at O'NEIL's house that night: JEFF BRYANT, JEFF MADDEN, DINA BRYANT and TIM MASHBURN.

MATHEWS stated that DARREN O'NEIL talked to the boys the day of or the day before the incident and the boys said they had found the ultimate dealer. According to Ms. MATHEWS, DARREN O'NEIL told everyone at the party about what the IVES and HENRY boys said. O'NEIL didn't mention the name of the dealer and didn't say anything about the boys owing any money for drugs.

According to Ms. MATHEWS, DARREN O'NEIL stated that somehow the boys had learned that there was suppose to be a big cocaine deal going down near the tracks and that the boys were going to rip it off. O'Neil stated that the one they were suppose to rip-off was suppose to be the ultimate dealer. Ms. MATHEWS stated that she did not know how DARREN O'NEIL got this information.

Ms. OLLAR stated that her brother, CLIFTON, had told her that a man named JAMES CALLAWAY and a man named "COOKIE" had sold some cocaine to the boys and the boys owed them money for the dope. Information was that the boys did not have the dope or their money. Ms. OLLAR stated that CALLAWAY was suppose to have sent COOK to meet with the boys in an attempt to obtain the money and that COOK hit them in the head and placed them on the tracks and covered them with a green tarp and as the train passed over them he pulled the tarp away.

Ms. OLLAR stated that her brother said this was the word on the street and everyone in Bryant knew who it was. Ms. OLLAR stated that her brother didn't give a specific name who had told him this information. Ms. OLLAR stated that her brother, CLIFTON, knows JAMES CALLAWAY but she does not.

INVESTIGATOR'S NOTES

After interviewing TINA TAYLOR, Sergeant PHILLIPS and myself noticed some discrepancies in the interview that we had taken from JOELLE MATHEWS. We decided that we should contact Ms. MATHEWS again to attempt to clarify these discrepancies.

Sergeant PHILLIPS and myself returned to the Clear Lake Shoe Factory where Ms. MATHEWS was employed and attempted to contact Ms. MATHEWS. One of the ladies in the front office went back to get Ms. MATHEWS and a few seconds later a woman that was unknown to this investigator came from the back, apparently she was working in the factory in the back and told Sergeant PHILLIPS and myself that Ms. MATHEWS had become so upset after her interview with us that she had checked out of work and was leaving and going to Hot Springs to her mother's house.

After several hours of contact, Sergeant PHILLIPS and myself were able to identify the mother of JOELLE MATHEWS as being JACQUIE FONDOREN in Hot Springs, Arkansas. Sergeant PHILLIPS and myself travelled to Hot Springs, Arkansas and attempted to locate the FONDOREN's address with negative results.

I was finally able to contact JOELLE MATHEWS' brother at phone number 262-2973 in Hot Springs and her brother advised that JOELLE was not in Hot Springs, but that she had called him earlier that morning at approximately 10:30 a.m.

This investigator then contacted the Clear Lake Footwear Factory in England, Arkansas and asked if I could verify the time that JOELLE MATHEWS had checked out from the factory. I was advised that Ms. MATHEWS had not checked out, but that she was in another portion of the factory when we attempted to interview her. I asked if I would be able to talk to Ms. MATHEWS by phone and the lady who answered the phone advised that she would go and contact Ms. MATHEWS and bring her to the phone.

Ms. MATHEWS did come to the phone but seemed very irate about having to talk to this investigator concerning this investigation at that time. This interview will be covered in a separate interview of Ms. MATHEWS.

INVESTIGATOR'S NOTES

The purpose of these notes is to compare any commonalities present between two cases involving the deaths of individuals caused by their laying on railroad tracks and being struck by a passing train and the case under consideration involving Don Henry and Kevin Ives. The cases thus examined are: 1) Newton County, Missouri, 8/20/85, 2) Poteau County, Oklahoma, 6/25/84.

Newton County, Missouri, 8/20/85:

In this case, it is apparent from interviews of witnesses and the prior behavior of the two victims that their deaths were caused by their attempting to lie between the rails of the tracks and have the train pass over them, as they had done many times in the past while playing under the railroad overpass where they were killed. They simply misjudged the clearance between the roadbed where they were lying and the bottom of the train.

The only similiarities between their case and the IVES/HENRY case is the relative ages of the victims, 13 and 15, and the fact that they were wearing dark clothes. Also, the witnesses on the train stated that there was no movement on the part of the victims prior to impact. There were no drugs or alcohol found in either victim. It should be noted, however, that the case file is not extensive. For example, except for the mention of the drug/alcohol screen, there is no medical report of any kind.

Poteau County, Oklahoma, 6/25/84:

This case is similiar to the IVES/HENRY case in a great many respects. In the first place, there is no indication that the two victims were of the personality type to lie down in front of a train as a dare or to let the train pass over them for a thrill. The behavior of the victims prior to their deaths was not indicative of someone planning suicide and no suicidal tendencies had been noted. The reason they were on the railroad tracks is unknown.

At the scene, at least one, and conceivably both of the individuals were laying at right angles to the track with parts of their bodies on top of the rails. The wounds are indicative of both laying across the tracks, with amputations noticed on both bodies. There was no mention in the witnesses' statements of either victim attempting to move prior to impact, even though the train started sounding its horn while still 100-125 feet away from impact. Both bodies presented extensive post-mortem trauma during the autopsy.

During the autopsy, drug tests were negative for both victims, but they had blood alcohol contents of .03% and .16%. One witness stated that both victims were "pretty drunk" prior to their deaths. According to the case file, one victim, for whom there is ample documentation, was involved to some extent with drugs. There is very little in the file for the other victim, but no drug involvement is mentioned. The former victim also appeared afraid for his life some time prior to his death and, according to at least one witness, stated that someone was out to kill him. The reason for this fear is unspecified, although, a few days prior to his death, he had been stabbed in an altercation over a bad check he had received for work done.

In summary, it can be said that the Missouri case will probably be of little use to us in our investigation of the IVES/HENRY case; however, the Oklahoma case bears several similarities which, if born out in the investigation of like cases, may have some bearing on the case under consideration. The main points are:

1. The lack of explanation for the victims' being on the track.
2. The position of one, and probably both, of the bodies on the track.
3. Lack of movement on the part of the victims prior to impact. (even though this was mentioned in the Missouri case also.)
4. Extensive post-mortem injuries noticed on the victims at autopsy.
5. The mention of drugs in the IVES/HENRY case and in connection with at least one of the Oklahoma victims.
6. In both cases, the victims were killed some distance from the nearest crossing or access.

On June 13, 1988, at 3:45 p.m., I interviewed BILL RUMMEL concerning knowledge he might have of the deaths of KEVIN IVES and DON HENRY.

RUMMEL gave me the following information.

He knew KEVIN IVES, but did not know HENRY. IVES had played football with RUMMEL's nephew BRINSON. IVES had lived near RUMMEL's home and spent a lot of time in the neighborhood. IVES visited ASHLEY MONK and the "HONEY Girls" who lived near RUMMEL.

"RUMMEL said that approximately six months before IVES' death, he understood that IVES went to work for a Safeway store on Geyer Springs. IVES had stopped by the house periodically to check on his family, but RUMMEL understood that IVES had possibly had become involved in drugs and did not associate with many of the neighborhood kids during 1986.

RUMMEL said that sometime ago DAN HARMON and RICHARD GARRETT came by to visit him at his home and discussed the prostitution charges pending against him in Saline County. RUMMEL said they indicated they could possibly help them with the charges if he could "more or less go undercover" with the kids to talk to them and get leads.

RUMMEL said he did obtain some information and passed that along to the Special Prosecutor.

According to RUMMEL the District Prosecuting Attorney, JOE KELLY HARDIN, found out about the "deal" in return for information, and put a stop to the process.

RUMMEL gave me the following information which he believes should be pursued for information concerning the boys deaths:

CRIME:

He suggested to contact the MONK and HONEY girls who live in the Springhill Manor area. He suggested an investigation of activities and people associated with the Blue Note establishment in Alexander.

RUMMEL said there were rumors circulating that the night before IVES and HENRY were killed by the train, some teenagers held a bonfire party near the area of the accident. He understood that someone came out of the woods dress in camouflage waiving a machete and calling himself "RAMBO".

He said the children at the party ran away. RUMMEL mentioned this to Officer DANNY ALLEN of the Bryant Police Department and ALLEN indicated that that sounded like the same person who had fired at him with a gun several weeks before.

RUMMEL also suggested contacting IVES girlfriend, FNU ALLEN, BOBBY ALLEN, a white male who lives in Ranchet States, JOHN ALBERT, a white male who lives on Viny Ridge Road, TERRY MILLER from the Crystal Lake area, SHEA CHANDLER, a young man who is approximately 1½ year younger than IVES, but did associate with IVES, and was alleged to have smoked dope from the same bag with IVES. CHANDLER lives in an apartment on Reservior Road and his wife and his mother BETTY work at Systematics Computer on Highway 10. CHANDLER works at Cantrell Gardens on Cantrell Road in Little Rock.

RUMMEL said neither IVES nor HENRY had never in anyway been associated with the solicitation of prostitution charges for which he is currently awaiting trial."

Deputy WYLIE, who is a Saline County Deputy was interviewed by this investigator at the Saline County jail on June 15, 1988 at 3:00 p.m., and he related as follows.

"I don't know how reliable this information is because it has gone through about three or four people before I received it. The information is that there is suppose to be some boy, whose name I don't know is suppose to have told that he had given a girl \$100.00 to get him some cocaine, but the girl took the money and left and he has not seen her since. Some how this boy is suppose to have ended up at a house over somewhere close to Shannon Hills, it had surveillance cameras at the front gate and it's also surrounded by a brick wall. The boy told that he is suppose to have told someone at the gate about the girl running off with his \$100.00 and they let him in and two men armed with machine guns led him to a room, that also had a surveillance camera in it. This room the boy says there was a table with some money on it and some cocaine. The men told the boy here is all the cocaine you will get, so he snorted some of the cocaine and then the men escorted him back outside and they told him that they usually don't let anyone leave that has been inside, but he could and if he told anyone they would find out about it and that he would end up on the railroad tracks like the two boys."



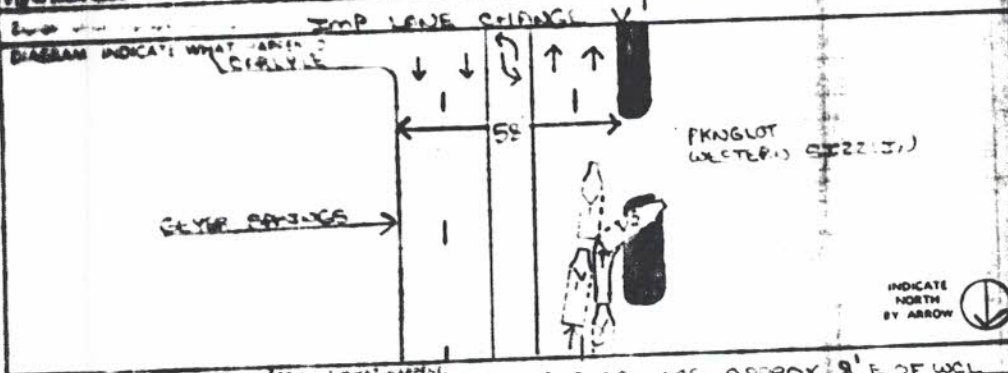

Mr. GODWIN was interviewed by this investigator along with Deputy Prosecuting Attorney RICHARD GARRETT on June 20, 1988 at 4:45 p.m., and he related as follows.

"Last August on either a Sunday night or a Saturday night I was on my way home and as I passed MILLER's Grocery Store in Alexander, I observed a police car that was gray in color with three antennas on the trunk and a spotlight by the driver's door sitting in the driveway to the grocery store. There were a couple of officers pushing a subject up against a telephone booth. I pulled off the road by some tracks and watched, there was a subject laying on the ground not moving and another officer was standing off to the side of the car.

I could not tell much about the officers except the one pushing the subject against the phone booth and he was about 200 pounds, six foot tall, with sort of long brown hair, wearing a white or a light color shirt. As I stopped my car I saw them pick the boy up off the ground and throw him into the back seat.

After putting the boys into the back seat of the car they drove off up to the top of the mountain, I guess in about three to five minutes they came back down and drove past where I was sitting. I did not see the boys in the car at this time, just a grocery or a garbage bag sitting in the back seat."

This interview was conducted via public service with Ms. GRANT at her residence by Investigator DAVE DILLINGER. The interview commenced at 12:19 p.m. on June 22, 1988.

During this interview, Ms. GRANT stated that approximately one month ago, her son, JASON, was "attacked" by two young white males wearing camouflage clothing, including camouflage netting over their face. She stated that JASON was not hurt and was released after some roughhousing. During the altercation, Ms. GRANT stated, one of the individuals asked JASON about another young man who lives in the Bryant area. Ms. GRANT stated that she wasn't overly concerned about this incident and attached no significance to it other than child's play.

Ms. GRANT stated that she was reluctant to give the name of the individual whom the people in the camouflage clothes asked about. It's the opinion of this investigator that Ms. GRANT knows the identities of these people, but does not wish them brought into the matter because they are members of her husband's church, Indian Springs Baptist Church in Bryant.
